VALE SIMON HINGE

The Australian Bridge community is reeling today after the sudden loss of one of the most colourful bridge personalities in Australia for more than half a century, Simon Hinge.


Simon was my favoured bridge partner in a bridge career spanning 55 years. I was proud to be his partner and admired both his bridge brain and his sometimes devilish decisions. He would say after something went wrong "well, at least you gave it a go".

I can't say with any certainty when we formed a partnership, but it was enduring, and while we didn't always agree, we never argued. Simon, known to be intolerant of what he considered stupidity, could appear aloof and irascible, but he could also be extremely loveable.

In his 50+ years of competitive bridge, with Simon partnering many notable partners, Simon amassed nearly 11,000 masterpoints, making him a worthy Emerald Grand Master.

Simon also served the bridge community well. He was on the ABF Management Committee for a number of years, and was instrumental in helping design the current ABF website.

Simon was like an iceberg, with only part of his immense personality showing above water. He was successful in compartmentalising areas of his life. His beloved rubber bridge game on a Friday evening saw him rub shoulders with bridge players seldom if ever seen at a bridge club.

His love for cryptic crosswords and trivia online with his band of cronies, his fascination for Collingwood Football Club, and his album of "old sheds" photographed on his travels these are all legendary facets of the man. While he grew up in South Australia his many friends in Victoria are the ones who knew him best, some of them now lost to us all.

My most satisfying win in recent years (the 2018 Spring National Open Teams) saw Simon and I team with talented youngsters Ella Jacob (Pattison) - Nye Griffiths. Simon's personality could span the generations, and he was great friends with young people like Laura Ginnan, our Summer Festival Organiser, who showcased her imagination by organising Simon's 70th birthday party in June 2022.

He was also a great friend to the late Jeannette Collins, and they could be seen enjoying strong lattes at all the trendy cafes in Simon's favoured St Kilda/Middle Park/South Melbourne zones.

Today, the end came suddenly for my dear friend.

Travelling to our favourite event, the Summer Festival, a sharp cry and his head turned to one side, the life went out of Simon's eyes and despite the efforts of Andrew Mill, two willing onlookers, the ambulance and paramedic personnel Simon could not be revived.

Simon boasts an impressive bridge career that spans decades of elite competition. He represented the Open APBF Team in 1994 and 2005 and competed in the prestigious WBF d'Orsi Senior Teams in 2013. Simon also served as the Non-Playing Captain of the Venice Cup Teams in both 1991 and 2007. These international accolades complement his numerous National Titles.

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Mixed Playoff - The Baker's Mixed Dozen by Peter Gill and Michael Courtney

Introduction by Peter Gill



Empathy or point of view - dashing deals from the recent Mixed Playoff conflict

Empathy.

The most important skill at bridge (and perhaps life) is the ability to see things from other people's points of view. Here is a master-class example from the quarter-finals of the Mixed Teams Playoff.



Neither of us fancied bidding with the dreaded three card holding in spades, so we missed a game reached at the other tables. Even so, this was my favourite deal from the Playoff. Arlene led the club king, which held. Now Arlene looked at the deal from declarer's point of view. Ella is unlikely to hold the club jack (or she could win the first club to ensure two club winners. But partner's club jack is most certainly doubleton, so on a low club continuation, declarer will duck and partner is unable to continue clubs.

So Arlene played the CQ, anticipating declarer's duck at Trick 2. Which is exactly what happened. Arlene could therefore stay on lead to continue clubs at Trick 3. So they made only dummy's two aces for minus 250.

A splendid play and a bone crusher. Declarer suffers the indignity of knowing that she would have won two club tricks had she won the ace at trick two.

Peter Gill has a habit of interrupting - here's his interruption.

We lost 8 imps when EW bid and made 5C at my table. North's 11 point opening and South's 1NT response on 3 points were duplicated at both tables.

Today's Tip: Even if your defence is wonderful, you still have to get into the auction when you're vul vs not vul, when the opponents might be stealing from you on light values.

The BBO commentary was by Australian bridge royalty Barbara Travis and Phil Markey. Phil has had an extraordinary year, winning three major events at year's end to score more than 200 masterpoints in just over a month and overtake Ella Jacob as

leader of the McCutcheon Trophy for most masterpoints in Australia in 2024. In 2024 Phil (stiffqueen on BBO) also became a member of the 2025 Australian Open Team and won huge worldwide online games with robots on BBO. Since then, Phil and his partner Joe Haffer have already been practising in Schafer games on BBO where they have been beating the world's best.

Barbara and Phil wrote a massive 35 lines of commentary on BBO about whether such a 1NT response needed to be alerted. Phil wrote:

"It is an awkward area where pairs think that the expectation of having 6-12 justifies the same explanation" Barbara wrote:

"here's what a good convention card looks like. Gill-Sylvester: 0-12 NV, 6-11 Vul". Liz Sylvester alerted 1NT as "0-12 (♠ fit possible)". The other table didn't alert. Phil wrote:

"We can agree that 0-12 is the better thing to go on the card." and "I think i am fine with the card either way as long as it is properly explained."

It's not just great bridge results that Phil is having this year - when he commentates, he's also trying to make sure we're all being actively ethical by informing our opponents accurately of our agreements and bidding style.

DECISION DYNAMICS EXPERT SUBMISSIONS

2C: 11 votes, Pass: 1 vote

Player name Bid		Bid	Comments		
Ishmael	Delmonte	2C	This is a perfect hand for garbage stayman Bid 2C and pass the response Knowing my luck partner will have 3316 with Stiff Queen of diamonds		
Mike	Doecke	2C	Stayman and pass. Most of the time this will improve the contract and 1NT is going to play badly.		
Ben	Thompson	2C	I routinely garbage stayman my way out with this sort of hand. Not absolutely ideal with only 4D (better is 5D, 43M, short C) but the 108 improve my position a little. Losing bridge to play 1NT with a very weak hand with a shortage opposite - provided you're reasonably likely to be able to get out to a fit		
Mikey	Ware	2C (don't mind pass)	(typed summary prepared from the live stream) I bid 2C but don't mind pass opposite a strong NT. The problem with the modern style is that we open 1NT with 5 card majors so it isn't just a 4-4 major that you are missing if you pass, it's potentially a 5-4.		
David	Gue	2C	Junk Stayman - I'll pass whatever partner rebids. A 4-4 major fit is likely to be better than 1NT, or a 2D contract should be fine if partner doesn't have a 4 card major.		
Renee	Cooper	2C	Definitely garbage staymaning here. I think I will pass 2D if partner responds that; my diamond pips are much better than both my majors.		
Peter	Gill	2C.	Stayman. I plan to pass partner's response. Many beginners are taught that you need 8 points to Stayman. Wrong. But much of what is taught to beginners is wrong.		
Pele	Rankin	2C	This hand is so weak. If opener's response is 2D, I will bid 2H - showing both majors, weak. Opener will pass or correct to 2S.		





DECISION DYNAMICS EXPERT SUBMISSIONS CONTINUED

James	Coutts	2C	Because of the significantly higher trick-taking potential in a suit contract, I believe it's right to bid stayman with this shape. Whether to bid 2H showing weak both majors, or to pass a 2D response is trickier!
Sophie	Ashton	2C simple stayman	I think I'm going to hope p can respond with a four card major. I don't think I'll pass partner in 2D - that could easily be a 42 fit (p could have a 3325 or even a (32)26. At least if I bid 2H over 2D I'm pretty much guaranteed to play in a 4/3 fit which should be ok. If p is 22 in the majors, well I've done badly!
Ron	Klinger	Pass	Playing simple Stayman, one can bid 2C and pass partner's response, which works out poorly only when partner has a 3-3-2-5 pattern. If partner bids 2H or 2S that figures to be better than 1NT. If partner bids 2D, the odds are reasonable that partner has 4 diamonds. In our methods, we cannot bid 2C as we play an extended version of Stayman.
Liam	Milne	2C	My plan would be to try 'Garbage Stayman', passing any bid from partner. Occasionally we will play a silly 4-2 diamond fit but we will also find some great 4-4 major (or diamond fits). My hand is so much better for suit play than notrumps that I'm willing to have a look for a better spot.



Simon and Jane have been practising via online bridge and a clever bidding app called Cuebids. Simon actually became addicted to bidding sets of 16 deals with Jane, and the pair had amassed around 4500 deals up to his death. It was all instinct, however on the following deal from the quarter finals of the NZ Teams at Mt Maunganui last year. With a good win required to vaunt the team into the semifinals, Simon faced this bidding challenge:

denying ♠Q, Simon leapt to 7C. With ♠Q to three onside, the grand slam was easy,

but Simon was not happy with his auction.

One of his favourite expressions when he had had enough of cuebidding was "Enough I've got it", was his expletive before barging into \$\display\$7. He decided that with six clubs, this constituted \$\display\$Q.
